## **DECISION ON TESTING PROPOSAL(S)**

Based on Article 40 of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 (REACH), you must submit the information listed below by **9 May 2024**.

The requested information must be generated using the Substance unless otherwise specified.

## A. Information required from the Registrants subject to Annex X of REACH

- 1. Extended one-generation reproductive toxicity study (Annex X, Section 8.7.3.; test method: EU B.56./OECD TG 443) by oral route, in rats, specified as follows:
  - Ten weeks premating exposure duration for the parental (P0) generation;
  - Dose level setting shall aim to induce systemic toxicity at the highest dose level;
  - Cohort 1A (Reproductive toxicity);
  - Cohort 1B (Reproductive toxicity) without extension to mate the Cohort 1B animals to produce the F2 generation.

You must report the study performed according to the above specifications. Any expansion of the study must be scientifically justified.

2. Long-term toxicity testing to sediment organisms (Annex X, Section 9.5.1.; test method: EU C.40/OECD TG 233 using spiked sediment or EU C.35/OECD TG 225)

Reasons for the request(s) are explained in the appendix entitled "Reasons to request information required under Annexes X of REACH".

### Information required depends on your tonnage band

You must provide the information listed above for all REACH Annexes applicable to you, and in accordance with Articles 10(a) and 12(1) of REACH, the information specified in Annexes VII to X to REACH, for registration at

You are only required to share the costs of information that you must submit to fulfil your information requirements.



# How to comply with your information requirements

To comply with your information requirements, you must submit the information requested by this decision in an updated registration dossier by the deadline indicated above. You must also update the chemical safety report, where relevant, including any changes to classification and labelling, based on the newly generated information.

You must follow the general testing and reporting requirements provided under the Appendix entitled "Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes". For references used in this decision, please consult the Appendix entitled "List of references".

## **Appeal**

This decision can be appealed to the Board of Appeal of ECHA within three months of its notification. An appeal, together with the grounds thereof, has to be submitted to ECHA in writing. ## Appendix A: Reasons to request information required under Annex X of REACH

This decision is based on the examination of the testing proposals you submitted.

#### 1. Extended one-generation reproductive toxicity study

The basic test design of an extended one-generation reproductive toxicity study (EOGRTS) is a standard information requirement under Annex X to the REACH Regulation. Furthermore, column 2 of Section 8.7.3. defines when the study design needs to be expanded.

## 1.1. Information provided to fulfil the information requirement

You have submitted a testing proposal for an EOGRTS according to OECD TG 443 with the Substance.

ECHA requested your considerations for alternative methods to fulfil the information requirement for Toxicity to reproduction. You provided your considerations concluding that there were no alternative methods which could be used to adapt the information requirement(s) for which testing is proposed. ECHA has taken these considerations into account.

ECHA agrees that an EOGRTS is necessary.

## 1.2. Specification of the study design

Species and route selection

You proposed testing in the rat. ECHA agrees with your proposal because the rat is the species preferred by OECD TG 443.

You proposed testing by oral route in rats. ECHA agrees with your proposal.

Pre-mating exposure duration and dose-level setting

You proposed ten weeks pre-mating exposure duration. ECHA agrees with your proposal. Ten weeks pre-mating exposure duration is required because there is no substance specific information in the dossier supporting shorter pre-mating exposure duration (ECHA Guidance R.7a, Appendix R.7.6-3). In addition, the substance is lipophilic (log Kow > 5.6); therefore, ten weeks pre-mating is required to ensure that a steady state is reached in the parental animals before mating.

In order to be compliant and not to be rejected due to too low dose levels, the highest dose level must aim to induce systemic toxicity, but not death or severe suffering of the animals, to allow comparison of reproductive toxicity and systemic toxicity. The dose level selection should be based upon the fertility effects, with the other cohorts being tested at the same dose levels. A descending sequence of dose levels should be selected in order to demonstrate any dose-related effect and to establish NOAELs.

If there is no existing relevant data to be used for dose level setting, it is recommended that results from a range-finding study (or range finding studies) are reported with the main study.

You must provide a justification with your study report that demonstrate that the dose level selection meets the conditions described above.



Cohorts 1A and 1B

Cohorts 1A and 1B belong to the basic study design and shall be included.

#### 1.3. Outcome

Your testing proposal is accepted under Article 40(3)(a) and you are requested to conduct the test with the Substance, as specified above.

Further expansion of the study design

The conditions to include the extension of Cohort 1B are currently not met. Furthermore, no triggers for the inclusion of Cohorts 2A and 2B (developmental neurotoxicity) and Cohort 3 (developmental immunotoxicity) were identified. However, you may expand the study by including the extension of Cohort 1B, Cohorts 2A and 2B and/or Cohort 3 if relevant information becomes available from other studies or during conduct of this study. Inclusion is justified if the available information meets the criteria and conditions which are described in Column 2, Section 8.7.3., Annex IX/X. You may also expand the study due to other scientific reasons in order to avoid a conduct of a new study. The study design, including any added expansions, must be fully justified and documented. Further detailed guidance on study design and triggers is provided in ECHA Guidance R.7a, Section R.7.6.

## 2. Long-term toxicity to sediment organisms (Annex X, Section 9.5.1.)

Long-term toxicity to sediment organisms is an information requirement under Annex X to REACH (Section 9.5.1.).

## 2.1. Information provided to fulfil the information requirement

You have submitted a testing proposal for a Sediment-Water Chironomid Toxicity Test Using Spiked Sediment (test method: EU C.27/OECD TG 218).

Your registration dossier does not include any information on long-term toxicity on sediment organisms.

ECHA agrees that an appropriate study on long-term toxicity to sediment organisms is needed.

#### 2.2. Test selection and study specifications

Sediment-Water Chironomid Toxicity Test Using Spiked Sediment (test method: EU C.27/OECD TG 218) is only appropriate to cover the information requirement for long-term toxicity to sediment organisms for substances which equilibration time (time to reach steady state in the body) is not anticipated to be very long (e.g. not highly lipophilic substance such as substance with log Kow < 5 and log Koc < 3; ECHA Guidance R.7.8.9.1. and R.7.8.14.2.) such as the Substance.

Under section 4.7 of your registration dossier you provide a Log Kow value for the Substance of 5.6 based on Partition coefficient (n-octanol/water), HPLC method (EU A.24/OECD TG 117).

Therefore, the equilibration time for the Substance is anticipated to be very long. For such substance, the Sediment-Water Chironomid Life-Cycle Toxicity Test Using Spiked Water or Spiked Sediment (test method: EU C.40/OECD TG 233), which is an extension of the proposed test, must be conducted (ECHA Guidance R.7.8.9.1. and R.7.8.14.2.). Alternatively, you may



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also consider conducting a Sediment-Water Lumbriculus Toxicity Test Using Spiked Sediment (test method: EU C.35/OECD TG 225).

ECHA Guidance R.7.8.10.1 specifies that spiking the water phase does not accurately represent accumulation processes within the sediment lasting longer than the test period and is only regarded as applicable to simulate pesticide spray drift event and other type of exposure (e.g. chemical spill). For industrial chemicals with continuous and intermittent release, spiking the sediment must be conducted as this approach is intended to simulate accumulated levels of substance persisting in the sediment.

ECHA notes that the Substance has multiple industrial uses (not all of which are closed processes), as well as Article Service Life for both Professional and Consumer uses. Considering the environmental release pattern for the Substance, ECHA concludes that the study must be conducted by spiking the sediment phase.

#### 2.3. Outcome

Your testing proposal is rejected under Article 40(3)(d) of REACH. Under Article 40(3)(c) you are requested to carry out the additional test with the Substance, as specified above.



# Appendix B: Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

## A. Test methods, GLP requirements and reporting

- Under Article 13(3) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be conducted according to the test methods laid down in a European Commission Regulation or to international test methods recognised by the Commission or ECHA as being appropriate.
- 2. Under Article 13(4) of REACH, ecotoxicological and toxicological tests and analyses must be carried out according to the GLP principles (Directive 2004/10/EC) or other international standards recognised by the Commission or ECHA.
- 3. Under Article 10(a)(vi) and (vii) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be reported as study summaries, or as robust study summaries, if required under Annex I of REACH. See ECHA Practical Guide on How to report robust study summaries<sup>2</sup>.

#### **B.** Test material

Before generating new data, you must agree within the joint submission on the chemical composition of the material to be tested (Test material) which must be relevant for all the registrants of the Substance.

Selection of the Test material(s)

The Test material used to generate the new data must be selected taking into account the following:

- the variation in compositions reported by all members of the joint submission,
- the boundary composition(s) of the Substance,
- the impact of each constituent/ impurity on the test results for the endpoint to be assessed. For example, if a constituent/ impurity of the Substance is known to have an impact on (eco)toxicity, the selected Test material must contain that constituent/ impurity.
- 2. Information on the Test material needed in the updated dossier
  - You must report the composition of the Test material selected for each study, under the "Test material information" section, for each respective endpoint study record in IUCLID.
  - The reported composition must include all constituents of each Test material and their concentration values and other parameters relevant for the property to be tested.

This information is needed to assess whether the Test material is relevant for the Substance and whether it is suitable for use by all members of the joint submission.

Technical instructions on how to report the above is available in the manual on How to prepare registration and PPORD dossiers<sup>3</sup>.

# **Appendix C: Procedure**

The Substance is listed in the Community rolling action plan (CoRAP) where substance evaluation started in 2015.

ECHA started the testing proposal evaluation in accordance with Article 40(1) on 6 July 2020.

ECHA held a third party consultation for the testing proposal(s) from 16 December 2020 until 1 February 2021. ECHA did not receive information from third parties.

ECHA followed the procedure detailed in Articles 50 and 51 of REACH.

ECHA notified you of the draft decision and invited you to provide comments.

ECHA did not receive any comments within the commenting period.

ECHA notified the draft decision to the competent authorities of the Member States for proposals for amendment.

As no amendments were proposed, ECHA adopted the decision under Article 51(3) of REACH.
