DECISION ON A COMPLIANCE CHECK

Under Article 41 of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 (REACH), you must submit the information listed below, by the deadline of **21 November 2023**.

Requested information must be generated using the Substance unless otherwise specified.

A. Information required from all the Registrants subject to Annex VIII of REACH

1. Same In vivo genetic toxicity study (Annex VIII, Section 8.4., column 2), as requested below in B.1

B. Information required from all the Registrants subject to Annex IX of REACH

1. In vivo genetic toxicity study:

In vivo mammalian alkaline comet assay (Annex IX, Section 8.4., column 2; test method: OECD TG 489) in rats, oral route on the following tissues: liver, glandular stomach and duodenum.

OR

Transgenic rodent somatic and germ cell gene mutation assays (Annex IX, Section 8.4., column 2; test method: OECD TG 488 from 2020¹) in transgenic mice or rats, oral route on the following tissues: liver and glandular stomach; germ cells and duodenum must be harvested and stored for up to 5 years. Duodenum must be analysed if the results of the grandular stomach and of the liver are negative or inconclusive.

Information required depends on your tonnage band

You must provide the information listed above for all REACH Annexes applicable to you, and in accordance with Articles 10(a) and 12(1) of REACH:

- the information specified in Annexes VII and VIII to REACH, for registration at 10-100 tpa;
- the information specified in Annexes VII, VIII and IX to REACH, for registration at 100-1000 tpa.

You are only required to share the costs of information that you must submit to fulfil your information requirements.

For certain endpoints, ECHA requests the same study from registrants at different tonnages. In such cases, only the reasoning why the information is required at lower tonnages is provided in the corresponding Appendice. For the tonnage where the study is a standard information requirement, the full reasoning for the request including study design is given. Only one study is to be conducted. The registrants concerned must make every effort to reach an agreement as to who is to carry out the study on behalf of the other registrants under Article 53 of REACH.

How to comply with your information requirements

To comply with your information requirements you must submit the information requested by this decision in an updated registration dossier by the deadline indicated above. You must also update the chemical safety report, where relevant, including any changes to classification and labelling, based on the newly generated information.

You must follow the general testing and reporting requirements provided under the Appendix entitled "Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes". For references used in this decision, please consult the Appendix entitled "List of references".

Appeal

This decision, when adopted under Article 51 of REACH, may be appealed to the Board of Appeal of ECHA within three months of its notification to you. Please refer to http://echa.europa.eu/regulations/appeals for further information.

Failure to comply

If you do not comply with the information required by this decision by the deadline indicated above, ECHA will notify the enforcement authorities of your Member State.

Appendix A: Reasons to request information required under Annex VIII of REACH

1. In vivo mammalian alkaline comet assay or Transgenic rodent somatic and germ cell gene mutation assays

Under Annex VIII, Section 8.4, column 2 of REACH, the performance of an appropriate *in vivo* somatic cell genotoxicity study must be considered if there is a positive result in any of the *in vitro* genotoxicity studies in Annex VII or VIII.

The ECHA guidance R.7a states that following a positive result in an *in vitro* test, "adequately conducted somatic cell in vivo testing is required to ascertain if this potential can be expressed in vivo. In cases where it can be sufficiently deduced that a positive in vitro finding is not relevant for in vivo situations (e.g. due to the effect of the test substances on pH or cell viability, in vitro-specific metabolism: see also Section R.7.7.4.1), or where a clear threshold mechanism coming into play only at high concentrations that will not be reached in vivo has been identified (e.g. damage to non-DNA targets at high concentrations), in vivo testing will not be necessary."

Your dossier contains positive results for the *in vitro* gene mutation study in bacteria which raise the concern for gene mutation. In the dossier you provided *in vivo* studies however they do not address the gene mutation concern.

ECHA considers that an appropriate *in vivo* follow up mutagenicity study is therefore necessary to address the concern identified *in vitro*.

For the specifications of the study to be performed, see the request B.1.



Appendix B: Reasons to request information required under Annex IX of REACH

1. In vivo mammalian alkaline comet assay; or Transgenic rodent somatic and germ cell gene mutation assays

Under Annex IX, Section 8.4, column 2 of REACH, the information requirement for an appropriate *in vivo* somatic cell genotoxicity study is triggered if 1) there is a positive result in any of the *in vitro* genotoxicity studies in Annex VII or VIII and 2) there are no appropriate results already available from an *in vivo* somatic cell genotoxicity study.

In relation to the first condition, your dossier contains positive results for the *in vitro* gene mutation study in bacteria which raise the concern for gene mutation.

In relation to the second condition, your dossier contains the following in vivo studies:

- i. *In vivo* chromosome aberration assay (OECD TG 475) via oral route in mice with the Substance (1992a)
- ii. *In vivo* mammalian germ cell cytogenetic assay (OECD TG 483) via oral route in mice with the Substance (1992b)
- iii. *In vivo* mammalian erythrocyte micronucleus test (OECD TG 474) via oral route in mice with the Substance (1992)

We have assessed this information and identified the following issue:

ECHA Guidance R.7a clarifies that in order to justify that an *in vivo* somatic cell genotoxicity study does not need to be performed in accordance with Annex IX, Section 8.4, column 2, the results of the available *in vivo* studies must address the specific concern raised by the *in vitro* positive result.

However, the *in vivo* studies (i.-iii.) provided are not appropriate to address the gene mutation concern identified by the *in vitro* gene mutation study in bacteria. Therefore, the conditions set out in Annex IX, Section 8.4, column 2 are met and the information requirement for an appropriate *in vivo* somatic cell genotoxicity study is triggered.

In your comments on the draft decision, you agree to submit an updated dossier within the time period defined in the final decision on this compliance check and you indicate your intention to address and discuss the concern on mutagenicity.

However, currently you have not provided any new data or adaptation to address the concern for gene mutation in your comments or in the dossier. Consequently, the information requirement is not fulfilled.

Test selection

According to the ECHA Guidance Chapter R.7a, Section R.7.7.6.3, the transgenic rodent somatic and germ cell gene mutation assay ("TGR assay", OECD TG 488) and the *in vivo* mammalian alkaline comet assay ("comet assay", OECD TG 489) are suitable to follow up a positive *in vitro* result on gene mutation.

Test design

In case you decide to perform the comet assay according to the test method OECD TG 489, the test must be performed in rats. Having considered the anticipated routes of human

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exposure and the need for adequate exposure of the target tissue(s) performance of the test by the oral route is appropriate.

In line with the test method OECD TG 489, the test must be performed by analysing tissues from liver as primary site of xenobiotic metabolism, glandular stomach and duodenum as sites of contact. There are several expected or possible variables between the glandular stomach and the duodenum (different tissue structure and function, different pH conditions, variable physico-chemical properties and fate of the Substance, and probable different local absorption rates of the Substance and its possible breakdown product(s)). In light of these expected or possible variables, it is necessary to analyse both tissues to ensure a sufficient evaluation of the potential for genotoxicity at the site of contact in the gastro-intestinal tract.

In case you decide to perform the TGR assay, according to the test method OECD TG 488, the test must be performed in transgenic mice or rats and the test substance is usually administered orally.

Based on the recent update³ of OECD TG 488, you are requested to follow the new 28+28d regimen, as it permits the testing of mutations in somatic tissues and as well as in tubule germ cells from the same animals. This updated version provides for a transitional period for the new version. However, ECHA is aware that testing according to the updated OECD TG is already available from CROs and the new study design would provide meaningful germ cell data, so this decision requires the application of the new version.

According to the test method OECD TG 488, the test must be performed by analysing tissues from liver as slowly proliferating tissue and primary site of xenobiotic metabolism, glandular stomach and duodenum as rapidly proliferating tissue and site of direct contact. There are several expected or possible variables between the glandular stomach and the duodenum (different tissue structure and function, different pH conditions, variable physico-chemical properties and fate of the Substance, and probable different local absorption rates of the Substance and its possible breakdown product(s)). In light of these expected or possible variables, it is necessary to analyse both tissues to ensure a sufficient evaluation of the potential for mutagenicity at the site of contact in the gastro-intestinal tract. However, duodenum must be stored (at or below $-70~{}^{\circ}\text{C}$) until the analysis of liver and glandular stomach is completed; the duodenum must then be analysed only if the results obtained for the glandular stomach and for the liver are negative or inconclusive.

Germ cells

A subsequent germ cell genotoxicity study (TGR/OECD TG 488, or CA on spermatogonia/OECD TG 483, depending on the concern raised by the substance) may still be required under Annex IX of REACH, in case 1) an *in vivo* genotoxicity test on somatic cell is positive, and 2) no clear conclusion can be made on germ cell mutagenicity.

Therefore, in case you decide to perform the comet assay, you may consider to collect the male gonadal cells collected from the seminiferous tubules in addition to the other aforementioned tissues in the comet assay, as it would optimise the use of animals. You can prepare the slides for male gonadal cells and store them for up to 2 months, at room temperature, in dry conditions and protected from light. Following the generation and analysis of data on somatic cells in the comet assay, in accordance to Annex IX, Section 8.4., column 2, you should consider analysing the slides prepared with gonadal cells. This type of evidence

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may be relevant for the overall assessment of possible germ cell mutagenicity including classification and labelling according to the CLP Regulation.

Therefore, in case you decide to perform the TGR, you must collect the male germ cells (from the seminiferous tubules) at the same time as the other tissues, in order to limit additional animal testing. According to the OECD 488, the tissues (or tissue homogenates) can be stored under specific conditions and used for DNA isolation for up to 5 years (at or below -70 °C). This duration is sufficient to allow you or ECHA, in accordance to Annex IX, Section 8.4., column 2, to decide on the need for assessment of mutation frequency in the collected germ cells. This type of evidence may be relevant for the overall assessment of possible germ cell mutagenicity including classification and labelling according to the CLP Regulation.



Appendix C: Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

A. Test methods, GLP requirements and reporting

- Under Article 13(3) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be conducted according to the test methods laid down in a European Commission Regulation or to international test methods recognised by the Commission or ECHA as being appropriate.
- 2. Under Article 13(4) of REACH, ecotoxicological and toxicological tests and analyses must be carried out according to the GLP principles (Directive 2004/10/EC) or other international standards recognised by the Commission or ECHA.
- 3. Under Article 10(a)(vi) and (vii) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be reported as study summaries, or as robust study summaries, if required under Annex I of REACH. See ECHA Practical Guide on How to report robust study summaries⁴.

B. Test material

Before generating new data, you must agree within the joint submission on the chemical composition of the material to be tested (Test Material) which must be relevant for all the registrants of the Substance.

Selection of the Test material(s)

The Test Material used to generate the new data must be selected taking into account the following:

- the variation in compositions reported by all members of the joint submission,
- the boundary composition(s) of the Substance,
- the impact of each constituent/ impurity on the test results for the endpoint to be assessed. For example, if a constituent/ impurity of the Substance is known to have an impact on (eco)toxicity, the selected Test Material must contain that constituent/ impurity.
- 2. Information on the Test Material needed in the updated dossier
 - You must report the composition of the Test Material selected for each study, under the "Test material information" section, for each respective endpoint study record in IUCLID.
 - The reported composition must include all constituents of each Test Material and their concentration values and other parameters relevant for the property to be tested.

This information is needed to assess whether the Test Material is relevant for the Substance and whether it is suitable for use by all members of the joint submission.

Technical instructions on how to report the above is available in the manual on How to prepare registration and PPORD dossiers⁵.
